The corollary is that there will be plenty of bonsai and related material for you to purchase and add to your collection at this auction.

Members are invited to sell bonsai and bonsai related items at this auction. Offering items for auction is reserved for members of the Society. Of course, all are welcome to bid on items at this auction. The auction will be conducted in two formats, a silent auction and the live auction.

The success of our auction depends on assistance provided by our members. Help is needed for room setup and tear down, record keeping during the auction, registration of buyers and sellers and participation in the auction process. In broad terms, the auction schedule is found below.

5:30 PM Setup of the auction floor - setting up table and chairs.

6 - 7 PM Registration of Buyers, Sellers and auction items.

- 6:30 PM The Silent Auction begins
- 7:00 PM The business meeting begins (10-15 minutes).
- 7:15 PM The Silent Auction resumes.

7:30 PM The Silent Auction wraps up and the Live Auction begins.

When the live auction wraps up, payment for auction purchases will begin. The treasurer will accept your credit card for payment, along with a check and US currency. There are no provisions to accept payment for purchases prior to the conclusion of the auction. To eliminate the crush of purchasers wishing to pay *right*  *now*, buyers will be called in succession by their Buyer ID Number, starting with #1.

## Growing with Trees Jack Wikle

This title now seems completely appropriate in summarizing my 59 year involvement with bonsai art and my membership in our Ann Arbor Bonsai Society since I joined early in 1974 (50 years ago).

As I remember, there were seven people present at the first meeting I attended who were trying to decide whether to continue meeting or disband since the man who had been serving as president was moving on, I think to another state.

After getting home and giving the situation a lot of thought I realized traveling to Ann Arbor for meetings would be easier and far less time consuming than the drives I had been making to East Lansing to attend meetings of the now long disbanded Bonsai Society of Michigan (first bonsai society in this state). So I called one of the Ann Arbor people I'd met and told her that if they could find someone to be president, I would be willing to accept the responsibilities of vice president and program chairman. Betty Anne Duff (the one individual I feel comfortable in naming, because there are so many I could point to) did accept the presidency responsibility and I did programing for some six years in those early days. This began a long cycle of intermittent growth spurts accompanied by a lot of group effort, in growing our Society to today's reality.

I expect to continue my personal support for our Ann Arbor Society but, necessarily, from a distance. As many readers already know, I moved in mid-July from the home in Tecumseh, where my wife, Jeannine, and I lived for 56 years until her passing last October, to a small apartment in Washington Woods a City of Midland senior living facility. This move was made to bring me closer to my daughter and son-in-law who have been Midland residents for years.

In the mid 1960's, when I first began experimenting with bonsai culture as a horticulturist with a long interest in trees, my thinking was that I would learn a lot about trees and how they grow, and how to help them grow. That did happen but what also happened, almost completely unanticipated, was close involvement with interesting, enthusiastic, people, some who have become very close friends, and who I never would have met but for my personal bonsai involvement. Over time, a realization grew that, in many ways, the process of my bonsai experiment had become more important than the product. I was helping trees grow, but those trees were helping me grow in return.

I also expect to continue my longtime involvement with the display of bonsai at Michigan State University's Hidden Lake Gardens which began when I was fortunate enough to be hired as that Gardens' first Education Specialist. Being deserving of support was always a goal at HLG and the bonsai display there has matured over the years to become a very positive statement about bonsai art and a destination for visiting bonsai enthusiasts. With feet in both bonsai worlds, I have also been heavily involved with the coming to reality of a bonsai garden open to the public here at Matthaei Botanical Gardens where this Society has always met. The University of Michigan and this facility have in my mind been hugely important in growing the dream of ongoing display of bonsai here into the reality of today's outstanding display of its outstanding collection.

Of course the some two and a half hour travel time from Midland to Ann Arbor and on to Hidden Lake Gardens in the Irish Hills, not to mention the infirmities that come with aging, will limit my direct interaction, but I expect to continue as a supporter of bonsai activity in those locations and all other public bonsai display, anywhere access by the public is ongoing.

Fortunately, I do have some longtime bonsai friends living in Midland and nearby who I expect to be interacting with, meeting regularly in a study group environment.
