Mark Passarelli presented on Clay and Bonsai

He started in bonsai 35 years ago

Mark has been influenced by Jack Wikle

Mark has always liked small bonsai trees

Raw clay is basically mud

It has plasticity and needs to be heated for durability

Purchased clay is consistent

Terra Cotta pots are not durable and are absorbent

Stonewear has 1% or less absorbency

Vitrified pots are highly durable

Cones are a standardized way to measure temperature in a kiln

Forming can be done by hand or mold

Slip molding and press molding

Wheel throwing and hand slabbed

Mark likes visible seems for interest and keep the pots from being the same

Kiln can be wood, gas, or electric

Clay is unpredictable when firing

Wood kiln has variables that can give interesting results in the pot

Electric is reliable and accessible

Pots can be masculine IE square, rugged texture or feminine IE round and glazed

Kusamano is mixed plantings and displayed on own

Accent plants are usually single plants

Trudy Bulkley, 1942-2024

Many of us in the bonsai community are saddened by the sudden loss, Sunday, August 18, 2024 of Trudy Bulkley

Trudy's hands-on involvement in bonsai art began some 34 years ago when she and her husband, Jonathan, participated in a series of introductory bonsai classes at Matthaei Botanical Gardens. She went on to become a member and strong supporter of our Ann Arbor Bonsai Society. For years she was part of the last minutes-beforeshow-opening, watering and "touch up" team

Trudy was also co-author of at least one article published in the American Bonsai Society's Quarterly Journal, and she contributed wording and editorial skills regularly in generating much of locally distributed writing about bonsai art.

Over time, Trudy became an active bonsai volunteer at Michigan State University's Hidden Lake Gardens for a number of years. Most recently, she served on the five member, Jack Wikle Bonsai Legacy Fund Steering Committee, a fundraising and endowment building group supporting bonsai display and related programing at the Gardens.

Always a delight to associate with and ultimately a treasured friend to most people she interacted with, Trudy also was owner/ caregiver for some very nice bonsai, truly works of art, personal statements, she was justifiably proud of.
